

Mandela Class


This term Mandela have been focussing on experiments in science. So far we have created Carbon Dioxide, tested cooling and melting ice against time, created electro magnets, and dyed flowers to show how they absorb water from the roots and many others.





So for dropdown week we decided to investigate the science of giant soap bubbles. Students created their own bubble rings and then created bubble mixture using a ratio of 15:1:0.25 of water, soap and glycerine before seeing who could create the largest bubble.

The Science; "A bubble is made of a very thin sheet of soapy water called a soap film. Soap molecules line up on the inside surface and the outside surface, and trap water molecules in-between – like a molecular sandwich.



Over the years the school has been able to have cycling organizations offer cycle programs to the learners at Cambridge. This academic year the service has been provided by Bikeability.

Bikeability is **the government's national cycle training programme**. It helps you learn practical skills and understand how to cycle on today's roads. Bikeability gives everyone the confidence to cycle and enjoy this skill for life. For all levels of experience. Qualified, expert instructors.

The learners at Cambridge covered, balancing, the correct side on which to mount a cycle, the use of brakes and the general handling of their bicycle. All lessons started within the grounds of Cambridge School (playground) before progressing to the local park across the road. Bikes and helmets were provided for the lessons as well as qualified friendly instructors.

The learners all look forward to their weekly hour-long session. They have expressed feelings of excitement and happiness whilst waiting for Friday to arrive. They say the lessons are fun and make them feel good about themselves and all are proud of their accomplishments. The summer term has seen 16 learners taking part in the sessions, 7 of whom had no previous experience cycling. 10 learners can now cycle confidently in the park, 3 within the playground and 3 are still at the balancing stage overcoming their fears.

Phonics Games!

Electric Scooters

It is currently against the law to ride an e-scooter on a public road or pavement.

We understand that buying an e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can buy them from many popular retailers.



Current law

You can buy an e-scooter, but you cannot ride it on a UK public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place an e-scooter can be used is on a private land.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEV's), so they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements such as:

- MOT
- Licensing
- Tax
- Insurance

As e-scooters do not have numberplates, signalling ability and do not always have visible rear lights, they cannot be used legally on the roads.

What happens If I'm stopped by the Police

The Police will advise you of the current law about how to use an e-scooter legally and ask you to take it home. They may however still penalise you depending on the nature and gravity of the offence.

E-scooter trials

The UK Government is currently taking part in 'Future Transport Zone' trials for e-scooter hire, with a view to making them legal to use on the roads.

Enquire with your local authority for a trial closest to you.

As part of life skills accessing the community, we visited few places around the school. Seacole class enjoyed visiting the park and following road safety rules.



Turing

During the Summer Term, Turing Class students have developed their life skills regarding Access in the Community and have practiced how to cross the street by looking at left and right before crossing, and used the zebra crossing plus an island crossing.

The learners have gone to Sainsbury's to buy food from a supermarket, as well as learning how to use money/credit card, requesting help from shop staff when needed. The students studied about how to collect medicine with a prescription from the Pharmacy. For this, the visited a Pharmacy and they were explained how this prescriptions are filled by the doctor at the GP; then, a kind pharmacist gave them an example of a GP prescription.





The learners have also been practising their cycling skills, in school and in the local park.













As a reward of good listening and following instructions and finishing all their work we took the class for a school trip to bowling, organized by their class teacher Mr. Diego. On the 7th of July the class went to **Tenpin Bowling Acton**. They travelled on public transport to Park Royal. They all brought to school their zip oyster cards and walked from Cambridge school to the local bus stop. Travel was a unit in our Life Skills lessons so the trip allowed the class to use all the skills we had covered during this topic.

We divided up into two groups for bowling with 2 members of staff in each group. The class has grown as a group developing bonds and forming obvious friendships. There was team spirit, zero rivalry and lots of cheering for one another. Maths skills were used as they all checked the score board (**still learning whilst having fun**)








