


Cambridge School Ambassadors


Einstein Class






Charitable Events

So far this year we have raised £57 for Jeans For Genes day, £120 for Macmillan and £111 for Children In Need.




















Obama Class

Wiltshire Class


Wiltshire class have introduced 'Circle Time' discussions as part of our morning routine. Staff select a question and all the students and staff participate in answering. The questions have ranged from quite light hearted to ones that encourage self- reflection and have found that the students are quite engaged in the discussion. Each student also has 3 question tokens that they can use during this time to encourage critical thinking and decision making. Circle time has had a visibly positive impact as this has enabled the class to practice taking turns, the importance of listening to one another and respecting other people's input and opinions.



In our most recent English lessons, Miss Camilla has been going over figurative language with a focus of using similes, metaphors and alliteration. For alliteration, we practiced some well-known tongue twisters such as 'Peter Piper' and 'She sells' with mixed but fun results. We also worked together to build an acrostic poem using our class name and attempted to apply some of these figurative language techniques

Wiltshire class have also been attending trampolining sessions at Phoenix Academy as part of our enrichment activity on Tuesday afternoons. All of the students have been learning new moves and practicing putting together a sequence, and have also enjoyed seeing staff members join in as well!

and hard work. As well as their academic subjects, students have engaged in a range of practical

subjects and skills, including cooking a range of simple meals during Food Technology lessons, and taking part in a range of sports this term, e.g. football, basketball, rugby and a whole lot more!





One of our Rowling class' highlights this term was our assembly class presentation on Children in Need, where our students had to overcome their anxiety around public speaking and present a PowerPoint in front of their peers during assembly. The audience was very impressed with their confident delivery of this.

Our biggest success this term, was one of our Rowling students, Shane, winning the Jack Petchey award for his outstanding performance and achievement across all subjects. This student, not only did his best in all subjects, he also showed exceptional behaviour as a role model to his peers.

Turing Class

Managing Money and Budgeting

During the first term of the Academic Year, the students in Turing Class have been learning about money and recognizing the different coins in the British currency. They have learnt to find out the change from different amounts.

Students in Turing Class have also focused on activities about choosing items with budgets allocated to them and working out whether they could afford what they had chosen or not. This type of activity was very useful as it encouraged students to make choices and get rid of options that they couldn't afford.

Our students made a great effort at trying and completing these functional activities where they developed skills that they will be using in the real world such as: budgeting, making choices and taking responsibility.

Eatwell Guide/Healthy Eating

The students have been working on the Eatwell Guide, looking at the different food groups they can find in this guide and the importance of following a healthy and balance diet.

The class created lovely, yummy and balanced meals and looked a healthy menus. They also looked at safety awareness in the kitchen, as well as food hygiene and personal hygiene procedures in order to cook a meal. The students learned many valuable lessons, which they will be able to use throughout their lives, strengthening their knowledge during Cooking lessons.

These activities will help them improve their skills that will accompany them in the real world by identifying healthy food options and food hygiene.

School Assemblies

Turing class presented two great assemblies this term. The first one was about Black History Month, and they looked at important and influential black people in History. The second one looked at the famous 19th century nurse Mary Seacole who overcame racism, travelling to the Crimean War to treat wounded soldiers. The children read out loud to the rest of Atlantic Pod and gave excellent presentations!




Colouring-In Fun




